The Third Party building and energy consultant makes critical site visits during construction, and a final performance testing of the Home's components for **Quality Control and Assurances** that our building practices are in line with the highest Standards set for this climate by the Building Science Professionals.

**HERS Index:** 43 This is the National Standard for comparing home performance, like 'miles per gallon' is for a car. The Index is based on a comparison of the annual energy requirements for heating, cooling and hot water in the home being rated (with some standard operating conditions), to the annual energy requirements for the same home reconfigured to RESNET HERS *Reference Home*. What about Air Tightness? The "blower door" air tightness test, shows our Homes to be among the tightest in Wisconsin. This not only provides <u>reduced operating costs</u>, but provides <u>draft free comfort</u> while <u>protecting the structure</u>. This added <u>durability</u> comes from a sealed thermal shell around your living space preventing mold, structural damage, and adding <u>lifetime value to your home</u>. Air tightness standards ask how much leakage is there on all 6 sides of the home, during a 20 mph wind. To compare homes we use this number:

0.08 cfm airflow @ 50 pa pressure difference / square feet of all the surface areas (all six sides of the box). The Focus on Energy New Homes Program Standard is 0.20 cfm @ 50 pa/sqft.

The average remodeled home in this area is 0.35 cfm @ 50 pa/sqft.

## Can a house be too tight?

You have more control of Indoor Air because of the tight Home with adequate exhaust. Being capable of exhausting unwanted moisture and odors from the home is important, so each of your exhaust and intake devices has been tested. The indoor air quality is <u>under your control</u> and not so susceptible to outdoor fluctuations in temperature and humidity. To balance the humidity levels in your Home and/or get fresh air into your home, use the **Energy Recovery Ventilator.** This is an air to air exchanger that saves some of your exhaust heat and moisture, and has a tested exhaust flow of **102** cfm. This Model can be used in the humid months as well for fresh air intake. The Kitchen is vented to the exterior as well at **676** cfm, which is great for removing odors, moisture and gases from cooking.

## Furnace / Air Conditioner / Water Heater

The furnace is one of the best available with an <u>ECM blower motor</u>, that saves you amazing amounts of electricity. This variable speed blower ramps up slowly to provide more even heat as needed. When it is running it uses very little power so if you need to run it continuously for allergy seasons or comfort, you can economically. The furnace is a <u>96% efficient, cost effective model</u>, that incorporates 'sealed combustion" technology to bring outside air in for combustion, preventing combustion by-products from contaminating indoor air providing you with <u>greater safety, and energy efficiency</u>. And the <u>59% high efficient power vented water heater</u>, along with the furnace, will prevent combustion by-products from contaminating indoor air providing you with <u>greater safety</u>, and <u>energy efficiency</u>. You have a <u>13 SEER</u> Air Conditioner, which meets the Standards of the Industry.

**Moisture and Radon reduction system.** The sump pit is a sealed unit to prevent <u>unwanted Moisture and Radon</u> from entering your home.
