Single Family Residential Unattached - Spec home

How did SIP construction help you get this job?

This is my first spec home, everything I have done previously has been custom. Given the difficult and trickey nature of reaching the 2015 IECC code in an ethical manner while building with sticks, going with SIPs was a no brainer. If it cost me a hair more to do it with SIPs, that is nothing compared to building a vastly superior house correctly the first time. But I really think it cost me about the same as stick built. The decreased liabilities and call backs are an added benefit as well.

SIP wall thickness and core material: 6 1/2" EPS

SIP roof thickness and core material: 8 1/4" EPS

Describe the benefits of using SIPs on this project. Did SIPs help save time, labor, construction costs, or energy?

It saved a little bit of time. It helped with labor shortages as the framers had not used this material before but it was so easy to assemble it was difficult to put together incorrectly with fewer people. This quickly gave them confidence in the project as a whole. The framers were amazed at how strong and tight the enverlope was. As I told them (some of them had 30+ years experience), this is the best house ya'll have ever built and I have the science to back that up.

Describe any innovative design elements or structural engineering involved:

I definately took advantage of the SIP roof to vault the ceilings. I was able to utilize a 6' long linear electric fireplace as a show piece in the family room. It came out great. People have been impressed with how straight and clean the lines are on this project. SIP really lends itself to contemporary designs so it really helped us beautifully achieve those goals.

A single forced air system by American Standard. 18 SEER. Variable speed condensor. 4 zones. Only requires 2.2 tons of air conditioning as per the manual J.

Windows are a Milguard Vinyl casments. U-value is .27 and the SHGC is .23.

Electric Heat pump water heater (10 HPSF) with a convective loop delivery system. Like a recirculating system but uses convection to move the heated water naturally while the system is closed. No need for a recirculating pump that draws energy and eventually has to be replaced. The appliances are energy star rated.

The electric fireplace is capeable of showing flames without generating heat, if desired. Handy for Texas when it is warm out but you want the ambiance of a fire in the fireplace.

The bath fans have humidistats that turn on automatically when the humidity gets above 60% in the bathrooms and laundry room. They automatically shut off when the humidity gets back down to a safe level.
